#### **Selectboard Corner**

The Selectboard wishes everyone a happy holiday season and best wishes for a peaceful 2014 around the world. A **Special Town Meeting** will take place on <u>Monday</u>, <u>December</u>  $9^{th}$  at 7:00 PM to handle six articles that require transfer of funds to finalize our 2014 budget process. Most of the articles will focus on Town building maintenance accounts.

We have hired Bill Brooks as the new full time highway employee. He grew up in Leyden and is building a house here in town. Welcome aboard, Bill. As a reminder, town residents can get sand from the salt shed if need be for those slippery days that are fast approaching.

The Selectboard has met with the Building Needs Committee. They will be working through the winter months to help us determine what will be required to get the best fix or replacement for the Town Hall roof. They are also going to come up with a plan to upgrade the kitchen and create muchneeded additional office space downstairs, while keeping the cost down to a minimum. They will have these plans in place, along with the cost involved, for the Annual Town Meeting in the spring. We'll be able to debate and vote on what they present. ## **Board of Health**

We had a great turnout at the annual Flu Clinic, even though there was no election. Robin Neipp, R.N., still has some vaccine available for anyone who missed the clinic. Please call her at 624-5512 to make arrangements.

Coping with a new health diagnosis or ongoing chronic health issue? The Medication and Chronic Disease Self-Management Assistance Program can help.

Regional Public Health Nurse Lisa White is available to assist residents of Leyden with self-management of health issues. Effective symptom management can prevent unnecessary Emergency Room visits and enhance quality of life for individuals dealing with chronic illnesses such as COPD, heart disease, and diabetes. Medication reconciliation identifies if the client is taking medications exactly the as they are prescribed and provides an opportunity to screen for adverse drug reactions and other problems.

Disease-specific education, self-care checklists, pill organizers, blood pressure/heart rate monitors and other tools are available. The nurse can also provide assistance connection individuals with additional community resources that my be helpful.

## T'ai Chi Ch'uan Demonstration Class

T'ai Chi Ch'uan (pronounced TIE gee chwahn), also transliterated as Taiji or Tai Chi, is a centuries-old Chinese internal martial art practiced for health, relaxation and self-defense. It is characterized by rounded continuous movements directed by a calm yet concentrated mind. The movements embody alternating action (yang) and relaxation (yin) causing a continuous cycle of energy (chi) flowing out to the extremities and back to the center (tan t'ien) of the body. Daily practice of T'ai Chi Ch'uan improves muscle tone, increases body awareness and joint flexibility, balances energy and metabolism, improves posture and breathing, relaxes the body, calms the mind, and brings healing energy to the internal organs.

Unlike exercise in the western world, which concentrates on the outer movements and develops the physical body, T'ai Chi Ch'uan develops both the mind and the body. Conditioning exercises build strength in the legs, spine, waist, and internal organs; the meditative aspects develop a firm foundation (root), deep respiration, a calm and focused mind and proper bone alignment.

T'ai Chi Ch'uan both builds and rebuilds the spirit and the body. Practitioners often tell of increased mental capacity, lucid thinking, a sense of peacefulness, sounder kidneys, better digestion, lowered blood pressure, and better injury resistance.

T'ai Chi Ch'uan not only promotes health but also applies to everyday life. For example, the posture "roll back" teaches relaxation, the ability to step aside from a quarrel or an attack—or to roll back—instead of meeting the attacker or stress with force.

In its advanced form, T'ai Chi Ch'uan can be studied for its meditative, medical, and self-defense aspects. Each posture has many functions for martial arts applications. The goal and highest use of T'ai Chi Ch'uan is the cultivation of robust health.

Sifu (teacher) Roy moved to Leyden in 2003. He is a 7<sup>th</sup> generation disciple in the Yang family T'ai Chi Ch'uan lineage from Grand Master T. T. Liang, an 8<sup>th</sup> degree Black belt in American Karate, a 5<sup>th</sup> degree Black belt in Modern Arnis and a Master Instructor of Bagua Zhang, Qigong and I Ch'uan. Sifu Roy has been studying eastern philosophy and practices since the 1960's and has operated the J. R. Roy Martial Arts Studio full time since 1978. He has taught seminars and training camps throughout the US and is internationally recognized as a Master Instructor.



WiredWest continues to work for funding to get fiber optic cable to our homes in western MA. We are working with Mass Broadband Institute to get passage of the IT Bond bill before the legislature which includes \$40 million dollars for last-mile infrastructure. Several WiredWest board members and managers, including our own member, Albert Woodhull, attended a recent hearing to urge passage of the bill. In addition, we are applying for other government monies through the Rural Utilities Service at the US Dept. of Agriculture. We are looking to attract capital from private businesses which might want to help with the last mile so that they can also provide services. This is where our support cards are so important. Our towns are small, but together we provide an attractive potential marketplace. The amount of money we need to raise is very substantial, as is our desire to maintain as much ownership as possible. The more we own, the more we can return to our towns once this project is thriving, and the more control we will have over quality and variety of services.

If you have not filled out a support card, you can go to wiredwest.net, or you can call me at 774-5922 and I will do it for you. We can't emphasize enough how important that indication of support continues to be. Thank you again to those of you who have indicated your support.

The November WiredWest meeting was held at our Town Hall on the 2<sup>nd</sup>. Albert Woodhull and I were helped by Sharon Mallory, Leo Hourihan, and Bill Howarth. 

## The Leyden Working Farms and Forests Conservation Partnership

#### 12 Neighbors Protecting our Town's Rural Heritage

-800 acres protected along North County, West Leyden, Mid County, Greenfield, and Bell Roads-

A joint effort of local landowners, the Leyden Conservation Commission, the Leyden Select Board, Franklin Land Trust, Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources, Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust, and the New England Forestry Foundation.

#### LOCAL PRODUCTS and ECONOMY



- This project permanently protects the working landscape and economy. Dairying and wood products were once the largest industries in Leyden, and this project supports both.
- As dairy farms are disappearing across the state, this project saves Bree-Z-Knoll, the last active dairy farm in town.
- Several of the properties are managed for maple sugar production, which is now the biggest industry in Leyden.
- Most of the land is already enrolled in the Chapter 61 programs, so the Town will keep getting tax revenue.
- Bree-Z-Knoll Farm, Spirit Fire Meditative Retreat Center, and Angel's Rest Retreat Center each provide employment opportunities.
- This project conserves a scenic, rural neighborhood. People moving to Leyden appreciate the scenic quality, privacy, and smalltown feel of the area. Regionally, conservation land has been shown to boost value of surrounding homes.
- Several landowners have reserved house lots to allow for future development, and everyone has the option to sell their homes and conserved land in the future.

#### LOCAL RECREATION and TOURISM



- Bree-Z-Knoll Farm, Spirit Fire Meditative Retreat Center, and Angel's Rest Retreat Center all draw visitors to Leyden, from near and far.
- All protected properties will have public access of some kind, especially for passive recreation activities like hiking, nature viewing, and horseback riding.
- Several properties will continue to allow hunting.
- Existing snowmobile trails will stay open.
- All-Terrain-Vehicle (ATV) use will not be allowed for recreational purposes.
- The project conserves woods and streams that are important for the movement of many animals, including birds, Eastern Brook Trout, bear, and moose.

#### LOCAL CHOICES



- The project supports long-term residents and families.
- It was initiated by local landowners and organized through neighborhood meetings.
- All of the landowners will continue owning their properties and will be able to sell it in the future. They can keep doing things they're already doing on the land, including farming, forestry, firewood cuts, and hiking.
- No land is being sold to a land trust or to a state agency.

### **Neighborhood Land Choices– Good for Leyden**

## **HOLIDAY RECYCLING REMINDER**

**Happy Holidays!** Thank you for your recycling efforts over the past year. Following are some guidelines for recycling during the holiday months and all year long:

Please **DO** include the following items in your paper recycling mix:

- $\checkmark$  corrugated cardboard boxes
- $\checkmark$  paperboard gift boxes



TIP: Keep a recycle bin or paper bag near gift wrapping and unwrapping.

- $\checkmark$  greeting cards (except those with foil, metallic inks, or glitter)
- ✓ wrapping paper, gift bags, tissue wrap (except those with foil, metallic inks, or glitter)
- ✓ paper shopping bags (any type of handle is okay)
- $\checkmark$  catalogs and calendars

Please **<u>DO NOT</u>** include the following items in your recycling mix:

- ribbons, bows, and tinsel (reusable from year to year)
- > packing peanuts and Styrofoam (accepted for reuse at Greenfield UPS Store)
- > holiday lights (WtE scrap metal recycler in Greenfield pays .20/lb. for light strings)
- > plastic bags (clean, dry plastic bags marked #2 or #4 recyclable at some retailers)
- blister packaging (formed plastic package used to hold toys and electronics)
- > photographs
