The Honor Court from the Sheriff's Department has been busy painting the walls and ceilings in the Town Hall dining room and kitchen. The Selectboard and the Building Needs Committee will meet in the dining hall on Monday, February 10<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 PM to discuss final plans to bring the kitchen into compliance with Board of Health regulations. We ask all residents who use this facility to please attend this meeting. We need your help as we finalize the plans to get things ready for discussion, and hopefully for approval at the Annual Town Meeting (ATM) in May.





# War and Peace Project

The War and Peace Project, a collaborative fusion of literature and art, has been invited to exhibit at Hampden Gallery Fine Arts Center at the University of Massachusetts Amherst from February 23–March 13, 2014, with an opening reception on February 23, 2–4:00 PM. The show will be co-curated by Leyden residents Lola Baltzell and Trish Crapo.

The project consists of 747 individual collages that combine to form a unique work based on Leo Tolstoy's classic novel, *War and Peace*. It has been shown in part in Boston and New York, but this will be the first time the project will be shown in its entirety in the United States.

A selection of the collages was shown at the Moscow International Book Fair in June 2012, after which the entire project was exhibited at Yasnaya Polyana, the Leo Tolstoy Estate and Museum in Tula, Russia. Baltzell and Crapo traveled together twice to Russia, first in 2011 to plan for the show, and then in 2012 with six other artists to attend the opening reception and to offer several days of workshops in collaborative collagemaking to a very enthusiastic Russian audience.

The War and Peace Project took over two years to complete. There was a team of artists who met weekly in East Boston as well as far-flung members in Atlanta, Berlin and Leyden. In addition, other guest artist friends were invited to participate. The Boston-based team worked elbow-to-elbow around a small table, sharing materials and exploring a collaborative process. Each 5x7 inch collage incorporates one page from the Russian text, and reflects some aspect of Tolstoy's novel.

#### The Circuit Breaker:

Tax Relief for Massachusetts Senior Citizens

15<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

Dear Friends.

Here's a reminder about "The Circuit Breaker," a tax credit for Massachusetts senior citizens age 65 an older.

It's called the Circuit Breaker Tax Credit because it is "triggered," like an electrical circuit breaker, when property tax payments exceed 10 percent of a senior's annual income.

Those who qualify will still be required to pay property taxes to their local communities. But they will receive a dollar credit for every dollar their property tax, and certain water and sewer bills, exceed 10 percent of their income, up to the \$1,030 maximum.

Senior citizens who rent their homes can also take advantage of the same dollar for dollar credit, up to the same \$1,030 maximum, if 25 percent of their annual rent exceeds 10 percent of their annual income.

No special application is required. If you are qualified, you can receive this credit by filling out a 2013 Massachusetts state income tax return before the April 2014 deadline. Official information packets from the state Department of Revenue for 2013 state income tax returns will include Circuit Breaker schedules and will be available in local libraries and post offices beginning early in 2014.

Here are the basic requirements for eligibility:

Must be a Massachusetts resident, age 65 or older;

Must own or rent residential property in Massachusetts as your primary residence;

Must have an annual income of \$55,000 or less for a single filer; \$69,000 or less for a head of household; and \$82,000 or less for joint filers.

You are ineligible for this tax credit if:

You are married and do not file a joint a return;

You are a dependent of another tax filer;

You receive a federal or state rent subsidy directly, or live in a property tax exempt facility;

Your property is assessed at a value greater than \$700,000.

This tax credit was approved in 1999, was implemented in 2001, and is based on a bill I filed after hearing concerns raised by seniors in Pelham. Over the years it has helped tens of thousands of seniors save millions on their property taxes.

This law is based on a bill I filed after hearing concerns raised by seniors in Pelham. I hope this tax credit will help alleviate some of the burdens property taxes can create.

#### **WiredWest**

WiredWest is a project of major proportions. It means that a huge amount of money must be raised. The support cards we keep asking you to sign are a visible indicator of the level of interest throughout the region, an important piece in selling the project to funders and providers. The Executive Committee is hard at work applying for a grant through the US Department of Agriculture's Rural Utilities Service.

This may mean that we will come back to you to fill out a survey similar to the support cards but *needing to be returned quickly by mail*. This will be a crucial component in the application for that grant. We really need the participation of all of you for the completion of this project. It is *our* project, our commitment to the growth and stability of our communities. As a reminder, if you have not yet filled out a support card, please go to wiredwest.net and do so. It is not too late to help to add weight to the urgency so many of us feel to bring our towns into the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

When our member towns joined WiredWest, we paid an initial fee of \$1,000. At our last meeting of the Board of Directors, we voted unanimously to come back to our towns for an additional \$1,000. This will be on the warrant for the Annual Town Meeting in May. I want to tell you about some of what that initial seed money has done, what we as member towns are getting for our investment, and why we need to contribute a bit more for this enormous and exciting project.

The work being done on behalf of the towns has been truly monumental. The Executive Committee of WiredWest has donated, and continues to donate, literally thousands of hours of time, beginning with the formation, operation, and ongoing management of a 42-town telecommunications cooperative. This has involved legal advice, compliance work, and fees on every level. It has meant building relationships with WiredWest stakeholders, marketing and communications, bookkeeping, grant applications and reporting, as well as fundraising. Our \$42,000 seed money then grew.

Close to \$150,000 has been raised through grants and donations. Additional work, estimated at over \$300,000, has been completed through donations of services and expertise, and volunteer efforts of our delegates, alternates, and other interested community members. This has included a feasibility study, market research, and economic impact studies. We had to create a GIS map database and work up high-level engineering and cost estimates. We as towns have not been asked to foot the bill for all this work. Our \$1,000 fee is a tiny percent of what is needed for the day-to-day work of this project.

At the moment, our main tasks involve four key areas: 1) Support the passage of the IT bond bill currently working its way through the State Legislature; 2) Work to form a partnership with Mass Broadband on developing the last-mile network; 3) Seek the additional funds needed for its construction and operation; and 4) Work closely with our member towns to assure local participation in the project.
