## **Select Board Office**

It's been a busy new year with many things going on in Leyden. The board has been attending many out-of-town meetings regarding schools and broadband.

Towns within our school district have met regarding establishing a new committee to look into how the district can retain excellent public education with state revenues staying flat, transportation cost not being paid at the promised 100% and falling enrollment numbers. Throughout Western Massachusetts, Berkshire, Hampden, Hampshire, and Franklin county towns are struggling with enrollment numbers that are declining. We simply don't have the enrollment numbers to bring enough state revenue in to support all the infrastructure required to maintain the level of education we all expect.

The new committee has been named the Honest Education and Retaining Trust (HEART) Committee. Leyden's committee members are Michele Giarusso, Ginger Robinson, and Rick Fontaine. They have a big assignment ahead of them. The Mohawk School District's similar BEST committee has

been active for over a year now. We look forward to collaborating with their committee as we all struggle with the same issues. HEART committee meetings will be posted meetings and held throughout the district. Please stay engaged to follow their progress. The BEST committee will be meeting with town officials of the Pioneer Regional School District on March 1<sup>st</sup> to share and collaborate on how to move forward with the new HEART committee. We have seen their summary report and the extraordinary amount of time and effort they put into it.

Broadband is still on the forefront of our agenda, and many things are continually changing. MBI continues to hold the purse strings and Leyden's Broadband Committee is actively engaged with them on many issues regarding the best way to move forward. Selectmen, Finance Committee members, a WiredWest delegate and residents recently attended a forum at which a new proposal was presented by Wired West. That new direction by WW is now going before MBI for their input. In the meantime,



## **Broadband Committee**

The Broadband Committee continues to closely monitor what is a very fluid situation and is staying in touch with all parties involved about broadband options for Leyden.

MBI received no satisfactory bids on its recent offer to subsidize private companies willing to undertake building of broadband networks in the 38 unserved towns. They have now moved on, and are ready to assist individual towns that are "deemed ready" to begin the design/engineering work necessary to build their own networks. Leyden is "deemed ready" by the State and has asked to be put in the first round of towns being put out for state funded design/engineering bids.

We have met with several people from MBI in recent days, including Chairman Peter Larkin, and have provided our input on potential changes that MBI is considering relative to the control and funding of the individual town programs.

We continue to explore all options for the Town, including hybrid and wireless systems, and are keeping in touch with any and all potential partners. We are aware of WiredWest's interest in helping to manage the network once it is built, but that decision is several years into the future and not a current concern.

Although progress was recently slowed by the state's attempt for a private build-out, it has not impacted Leyden significantly. We used this time period to perform the town's state-funded pole survey, and as a result, are now better prepared than other towns to proceed to the next step.

Basically, everything continues to move forward—even if a bit slower than we would have liked.

work is in progress. Pole survey work has been spotted in town and that is a positive sign of things to come.

There have been recent articles in the *Greenfield Recorder* regarding the purchase of a fire truck. The Select Board has held discussions with Fire Department personnel regarding the purchase, and the Fire Department was advised not to purchase the truck. Old Engine 1 is down for pump repairs and only has a limited amount of miles on it. Four-wheel drive is essential in this town because of our topography and our New England weather. Colrain recently purchased a new four-wheel drive fire truck at a price of over \$400,000. Our approach is to maintain our equipment and keep budgets within what we can afford.

We recognize the importance of public safety, and we also know that communications must stay on the forefront of the town's agenda. The Select Board, Finance Committee and Fire Department will look for solutions to resolve capital expenditure requirements that won't cause spikes in property taxes. We are grateful for the hours and commitment that the Fire Department provides for the town. However, the purchase of a fire truck by the Leyden Firefighters Association without Select Board and Finance Committee approval has created a problem situation that we are trying to resolve.

We recently had the Town Hall wood floors sanded and refinished. We tried to minimize the inconvenience by having it done in February. The floors are now back in good as new condition and look terrific. As soon as we get a warm couple of days, we'll try to get it aired out. Thank you to all who had to make some adjustments, as we know the building is being actively used, which is a good thing. Please take extra care to protect the "new" floors when you visit Town Hall.

The Select Board met with the Building Needs Committee, and the Historical Commission on February 2<sup>nd</sup> regarding the much-needed space for historical town treasures and office space. There is interest again in maybe pursuing the idea of trying to buy the old forge property, which would address the immediate need for space.

We have another meeting coming up on Tuesday, March 7<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm for further discussions. We'll ask the Finance Committee to attend this meeting to look into the best possible way of pursuing this option. We're open to all ideas from anyone, so if you have an idea please join the discussion.

This past month the town of Princeton reached out to MEMA looking for a generator for a little girl who had a heart transplant. MEMA put them in contact with Dan Galvis, and within a short time Dan put together a package and loaded up a generator and his tractor and drove to Princeton. The Princeton Fire Chief, John Bennett, and others helped Dan unload the gift for this little girl. Dan worked with other personnel and made numerous trips back and forth to Princeton until the unit was up and running. Now it's available for emergency use for the family of this girl. We would like to express our thanks to Dan for his kind assistance to these people in need. It's an uplifting story of one of our townspeople.

WiredWest presented a <u>WiredWest Broadband Solution</u> <u>Workshop</u> at the JFK Middle School in Northampton on January 28<sup>th</sup>. The event introduced the price schedule planned by WiredWest. Prices are based on contracting with an experienced organization that can provide network operation and ISP (Internet Service Provider) services. Basic 25 Mbps Internet service will cost \$59 per month, and telephone service will cost \$19 including national long distance. Negotiations are ongoing with two companies: Whip City Fiber, a division of Westfield Gas and Electric, and OTT, the operator of several networks in New England, including the Granby, MA, local telephone company. OTT also will soon take over parts of the Leverett broadband service previously provided by Crocker.

WiredWest will be responsible for paying a few bills beyond the wholesale cost of services. Part of the difference is various charges related to poles owned by electric or phone companies. WiredWest bills will also include a depreciation fee, required by law to guarantee that resources will be available when equipment needs replacement. This will vary from town to town and will decrease as additional subscribers are added.

On February 16<sup>th</sup> MBI held a hearing in Worthington to get feedback from town representatives regarding the responses to MBI's requests for proposals from private companies willing to provide broadband services to unserved towns. MBI heard from representatives of about fifteen towns, mostly with similar messages. Many pointed out that that MBI's requests for proposals had demonstrated that big private companies are not interested in serving small towns. A common request was that, since MBI has now left it up to towns to make their own arrangements for network design and construction, MBI should release funds to towns to do this. Many representatives also berated MBI for its previous hostility to WiredWest and requested that MBI support proposals for a regional approach. Many of those who spoke said they were attracted to Westfield Gas and Electric's offer to negotiate directly with individual towns or groups of towns to provide services at all levels, from network design and construction to network operation.

The ball is now in MBI's court; if they will release resources and let towns take responsibility we could see progress soon.

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
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
