We thank the editors of *Leyden Life* for their patience in accepting this article shortly after the deadline for inputs. As has happened several times before, the formal deadline coincided with a monthly meeting of the WiredWest Board of Directors. We asked for an extra day so we could be up to date.

At its April meeting WiredWest took a big step forward. As everyone knows by now, despite the State's early encouragement of a plan to build and operate a regional broadband network, after a period of confusion the State decided individual towns should build their own networks. Since then WiredWest has been planning a role as operator of a regional network composed of connected town-owned networks. WiredWest will subcontract to other organizations various aspects of network operation. WiredWest received thirteen proposals from potential operators, and two were selected as final candidates. At the recent meeting a decision was made to begin contract negotiations with Westfield Gas and Electric (WG&E). A long list of criteria was considered. A factor that weighed heavily in this decision was that WG&E is a municipally owned entity dedicated to service rather than profits, and as such is immune to stockholder pressures and mergers or acquisitions that could change the character of a private company.

In April WiredWest subscribers in Leyden received a "WiredWest Update" e-mail summarizing the current state of efforts to bring broadband internet access to unserved communities. We are grateful that of the 148 Leyden households who signed up in 2015 when we were striving to demonstrate at least 40% support for WiredWest's plans, only one has asked for a refund. The money is safe in escrow and if Leyden's network ends up being operated by WiredWest the deposits will be applied to the first monthly bill. More information about the current status of WiredWest is available online at http://wiredwest.net/.

Thanks in large part to WiredWest's advocacy, the full amount of each town's State allocation of funds for the Last Mile are now available. Leyden has already applied for a grant, and many of the initial planning and design steps can proceed even though the way the network will be operated has not yet been decided. But at some point a decision will need to be made. Once Leyden has built its network the Town will need to contract with a network operator. A town could make a private one-town arrangement with an operating company. WiredWest is offering a regional solution of many towns.

Some members of the Leyden Broadband Committee have objected to the articles about WiredWest that your WiredWest Delegates have been writing for *Leyden Life* almost every month for several years now. They say that WiredWest should be treated as a vendor with a product to sell. But WiredWest is not a company trying to sell a product at a profit—it is an organization of towns of which our Town is a voting member. Our Town has power to shape, and not just respond to, the organization's proposals. WiredWest meetings are open and it is not just the designated Delegate and Alternate who can participate. Unlike external vendors, WiredWest has been talking to Leyden residents for several years and has an obligation to keep the more than 40 percent of households who have subscribed informed of progress.

Who Said This Would Be Easy?

We recently received the results of the MBI state-funded pole survey of our 917 utility poles in Leyden and were told that 336 of these poles (36%) were categorized as "needing replacement" before broadband cable can be hung on them. Apparently, we have some poles that are considered too short to carry an additional wire, some too thin to support the weight of additional cable, and some simply defective and in clear need of replacement by the utility involved (Verizon or Eversource). This categorization of poles "needing replacement" represents a first pass by MBI's contractor, Osmose, and will be subject to negotiation with the utilities as we work to address the issue.

To put this problem into perspective, MBI originally estimated that the net cost (after State grants) for Leyden's broadband network would be \$1,070,000. This assumed a 4% pole replacement rate, or 33 poles. Should it become necessary to replace an additional 303 poles, at an average cost of \$2,500 per pole, this would represent an additional cost of \$750,000.

The question now is who is responsible for paying for poles that need to be replaced? To get that answer, we need to continue with our original plan, which calls for filing pole applications with the utility providers (along with the required fees) so that a pole-by-pole assessment/negotiation process can begin. As planned, we are in the process of hiring an engineering firm to assist us with the pole applications themselves and a Project Manager to represent the Town in the pole negotiation process. These costs, which were included in the original overall cost of the project, will come to approximately \$80,000 - \$100,000. All of this money will be paid for from State grant monies under the State's "Last Mile Infrastructure Grant Program".

At the request of the Selectboard, I have met privately with Leyden's State Representative, Paul Mark, to make him aware of our problem and the fact that this could ultimately prohibit us from going forward with the Town's broadband network. The Selectboard has also spoken with State Representative Steve Kulik to make him aware of our problem as well.

I think it's important to remember that any project of this size will always have problems that need to be resolved. With that in mind, we will keep you posted as we better define the situation and see whether Leyden can still manage to go forward with this project.



Tick Season is (ALWAYS) Here.



CDC reports 2017 may be a recordsetting year for Tick Infestation.

Leyden residents are eligible for *reduced-rate tick testing*. If you or your pet have been *bitten* (the tick was attached to your skin) by a Deer Tick, save the tick in a small, plastic bag.

The Leyden Board of Health, in Conjunction with the Cooperative Public Health Services of the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG), has negotiated a reduced cost to member towns. *Leyden residents need pay only \$15.00* of the \$50.00 cost of getting a tick tested.

Data collected for the 11 towns participating in the testing grant show that approximately 35% of ticks are infected with Lyme disease. Additionally, several more diseases are now associated with tick bites.
