Leyden was not represented at the May WiredWest Board of Directors meeting because it took place at the same time as Leyden's Annual Town Meeting. We don't have much new to report at this time. The next Board meeting will take place on June 10th, and we will report on that in the July Leyden Life.

Scattered among Western Massachusetts' small towns, there are many people with experience and knowledge that, if shared, can make up for lacks in any single town. Currently Leyden is concerned about the fact that our initial pole survey indicated the make-ready costs for stringing fiber along our roads could be higher than the estimates originally provided by the state. Even though those estimates were not based on solid data, so far there is no hint of additional state money based on reality. But other towns are having problems similar to our own, and they may find solutions or exercise political pressure that can help us.

On the table in the lobby of Town Hall we provided printed copies of two new documents, printed back-to-back on a single page. If you did not pick one up at Town Meeting, you can get copies from the WiredWest website. PRES Visit to Beneski Museum of Natural History at Amherst College

On Friday, April 14, most of Pearl Rhodes Elementary School (the first through sixth graders) went on a field trip to the Beneski Museum of Natural History at Amherst College. Transportation costs were paid with a grant from the Leyden Cultural Council, so there was no cost to students and families. Upon entering the museum, we were greeted by the director, Fred Venne, who led us in a 90-minute presentation of some of the amazing exhibits of the collection. We studied the fossils of a mastodon, mammoth, saber-tooth cat, cave bear, and Irish elk.

Mr. Venne showed us how the bones of these extinct animals mirror the bones in our own bodies. We learned about the evolutionary progression of the horse through fossils. We saw the skull of a T-Rex, and were able to interact with the large collection of dinosaur footprints. After lunch in a lounge in the Student Center, small groups did an independent investigation of the museum for about forty minutes, until we had to meet the bus. We are so grateful to the teachers and other chaperones, the Leyden Cultural Council, and Fred Venne of the Beneski Museum for helping to make this a fun and educational outing. Thank you!

We would like to let the community of Leyden know how things are going in Leyden's community church. On July 1, 2016 a new pastor named Nami Yu was appointed to the Leyden United Methodist Church. With Pastor Nami we have begun a new congregational journey of faith in Christ our risen Lord. By holding regular worship services, a Sunday School ministry, and ministering to folks in need, we are endeavoring to glorify God by loving people in God's holy name.

But Leyden UMC is a small church and with its size comes the serious challenge we are outlining in this letter. The Bible tells us to speak the truth in love. Our prayer is that you will take what is written below as an effort to be forthright because of a genuine desire to continue loving and serving the wonderful town of Leyden. We live during a time when truth is in short supply and spin reigns supreme, thus this appeal will be as straightforward and honest as possible.

Leyden UMC is struggling financially, which is a polite way of saying that on paper the church will be insolvent within six months unless people who care about its continuation are generous with their prayers and pocketbooks.

Such a statement sounds like an exaggeration designed to manipulate emotions and thereby solicit sympathy, but that most certainly is not the case. The facts of the matter are these:

The church treasury contains slightly less than \$6,000.00.

The congregation is small, with the average Sunday attendance hovering around 15 folks each week. Consequently the weekly collection is likewise small, despite generous giving on the part of the congregants.

The expenses are large by comparison, although they are hardly extravagant, consisting primarily of the pastor's salary and the building's utility bills.

Bottom line: The cost of keeping the doors open will exhaust Leyden's UMC's financial resources before the end of 2017 unless the Leyden congregation and community choose exuberant generosity rather than ecclesiastical extinction.

God provides, indeed He does. But the days of dropping manna from heaven are ancient history. Today the Lord uses women, men, even children, as the means of His provision—folks like you and me—people who see value in keeping the only house of worship in town viable and vibrant.

So, if you want Leyden United Methodist Church to continue shining God's light throughout the hills and valleys of our lovely area, please give to whatever extent possible.

Give, yes, but come as well. The Gospel always prioritizes people over money. You are welcome to join our congregation as a member, participate in Communion, or simply be a guest at our worship services and fellowship dinners. We'll even give you a ride to church if that would be helpful. Our pastor is certainly available for baptisms, weddings, funerals, and pastoral counseling. And never hesitate to ask for prayer; we will keep you before the Throne of Grace always.

Who Said This Would Be Easy?

We recently received the results of the MBI state-funded pole survey of our 917 utility poles in Leyden and were told that 336 of these poles (36%) were categorized as “needing replacement” before broadband cable can be hung on them. Apparently, we have some poles that are considered too short to carry an additional wire, some too thin to support the weight of additional cable, and some simply defective and in clear need of replacement by the utility involved (Verizon or Eversource). This categorization of poles “needing replacement” represents a first pass by MBI’s contractor, Osmose, and will be subject to negotiation with the utilities as we work to address the issue.

To put this problem into perspective, MBI originally estimated that the net cost (after State grants) for Leyden’s broadband network would be \$1,070,000. This assumed a 4% pole replacement rate, or 33 poles. Should it become necessary to replace an additional 303 poles, at an average cost of \$2,500 per pole, this would represent an additional cost of \$750,000.

The question now is who is responsible for paying for poles that need to be replaced? To get that answer, we need to continue with our original plan, which calls for filing pole applications with the utility providers (along with the required fees) so that a pole-by-pole assessment/negotiation process can begin. As planned, we are in the process of hiring an engineering firm to assist us with the pole applications themselves and a Project Manager to represent the Town in the pole negotiation process. These costs, which were included in the original overall cost of the project, will come to approximately \$80,000 - \$100,000. All of this money will be paid for from State grant monies under the State’s “Last Mile Infrastructure Grant Program”.

At the request of the Selectboard, I have met privately with Leyden’s State Representative, Paul Mark, to make him aware of our problem and the fact that this could ultimately prohibit us from going forward with the Town’s broadband network. The Selectboard has also spoken with State Representative Steve Kulik to make him aware of our problem as well.

I think it’s important to remember that any project of this size will always have problems that need to be resolved. With that in mind, we will keep you posted as we better define the situation and see whether Leyden can still manage to go forward with this project. *Bob Ryan, Chair*
