Select Board

Leyden seems to be having a run of misfortune. First with Bob Hardesty's injury, then the fire house and fire truck, the police cruiser accident on River Road, and the one-ton Highway Department Ford truck that burned up while sanding on Frizzell Hill (see pictures on Page 5). Bob has returned to work after being out for about six weeks following surgery on his leg. He thanks all those who stepped in during his absence, and especially Tracey Baronas and Lance Fritz. For those who haven't heard, the fire truck side swiped the station garage door while pulling out, which damaged the truck and building. The building has been repaired, but the minor damage to the truck remains to be repaired. The police cruiser took off while the driver was exiting the vehicle and struck a tree.

The Meeting with the Select Boards of the PVRSD member towns was canceled due to the snow storm, and it may not be rescheduled. The advertised purpose was to discuss the closure of PRES, but this was somewhat misleading. The discussion would have been about what questions we, as towns, should ask at our next ATMs.

Town Tax Collector, Roxanne Zimmerman, has come to us stating that she is required by State law to charge interest on late tax payments. The date the payment is received at Town Hall is the official date of receipt; not the postmark date, and not the date filled in on the check. It is the date of receipt at Town Hall. All mail received at Town Hall is date-stamped at the time of receipt, so there is no question about the date of receipt for tax purposes. *Checks received after the due date are late*, even if the date on the check is the due date. State law says Roxanne cannot forgive interest under any circumstances, so please get tax payments in by the due date. —Lance Fritz, Chair

March, the month of the lion's departure! As I write, we're preparing for our third snowstorm in two weeks! Library hours have been somewhat chaotic, but patrons know we'll be open on Tuesdays and Thursdays if the storms hit on a Monday or Wednesday. A big thank you to Trueman Robbins who drove over and shoveled the entrance, often twice in one day, first to remove plowed snow packed against the steps and again when the snow slid off the roof to block the entrance. Thank you, Trueman!

Our fundraiser continues. If you visit the library, you'll be able to view Pat Little's piece of art and purchase some raffle tickets—one for \$5 or three for \$12. All money will go to the library. Please help out!

From our annual report comes the following: Circulation of materials has been good. Throughout the year children borrowed 943 books or DVDs, young adults borrowed 611 pieces, and adults signed out 1,834 books, DVDs or CDs. Considering our limited hours (12 per week), 2,336 patron visits speaks well of the library's popularity.

The availability of interlibrary loan is extremely beneficial to the library's success. A total of 514 pieces came here from other libraries (as far away as Florida or Washington state) to fill patrons' requests for materials that we do not own.

Housed on our bookshelves are a total of 4,229 books, 7 magazine subscriptions, 352 CDs and 713 DVDs. As director I continually weed out those materials that have not been read in five years and replace them with the new and the popular.

I hope you will consider becoming a patron or the RML. It's free!
Rejoice! Its spring!

FYI: Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 89, Section 7A says:

You must immediately pull to the right and stop when approached by an emergency vehicle that is responding to an emergency. You cannot continue until the emergency vehicle has passed. No driver may follow within 300 feet of an emergency vehicle, responding with lights or siren activated. Police vehicles have video cameras and they will be in use when responding to emergencies. Violators who are caught will be mailed a citation for Civil Motor Vehicle Infraction, with a fine of \$105.00.

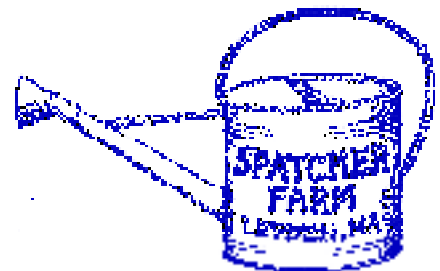

What's the Problem With Pet Waste?

Pet waste left in our yards and communities can have many adverse effects on the environment, as it is full of harmful bacteria and excess nutrients. Besides the fact pet waste is a neighborhood nuisance, it can make people sick, especially children who are more likely to come into contact with it while playing. Pet waste left on lawns can also kill or damage grass and other plants.

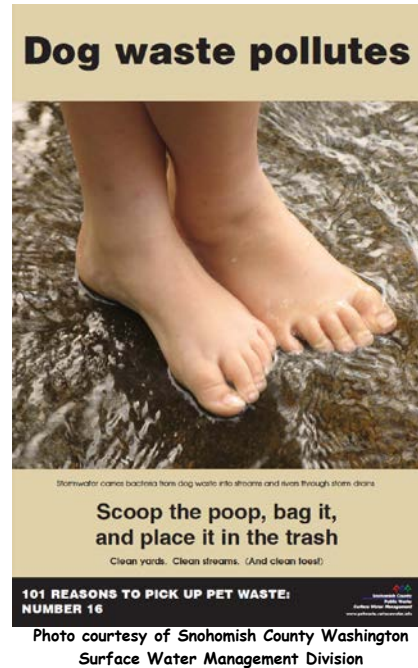


When pet waste is washed into lakes or streams, the waste decays, uses up oxygen and sometimes releases ammonia. This can kill fish.

It also contains nutrients that encourage weed and algae growth.

Water with too many nutrients becomes cloudy and green...imagine this in your backyard pond or stream!

Managing pet waste properly is something easy that everyone can do to make a difference in the quality of our surface waters.



Individual actions can result in a significant water quality improvement when carried out by a majority of people. Unlike some forms of storm water pollutants, individuals in our watershed can easily and economically manage pet waste and help to keep waters safe and aesthetically pleasing.

DOG WASTE AND SURFACE WATER QUALITY

Every dog produces about $\frac{3}{4}$ lbs. of solid waste per day...and about 7.8 billion fecal coliform bacteria.

When pet waste is left on the ground, rain or snowmelt carries the bacteria into our surface water supplies, either directly or through the storm drain system.

Microbial Source Tracking (MST)

Microbial Source Tracking is a set of techniques used to determine sources of fecal indicator bacteria in the environment. MST tests attempt to determine whether fecal bacteria are being introduced into water bodies through human, wildlife or domestic animal sources.



DCR Division of Water Supply Protection has had MST tests performed on several streams. Initial results indicate that dogs are a major contributor of bacteria to these waters. **We need your help** to eliminate bacteria by picking up after your pet in your yards and while on walks.

Rainfall and snow melt in the Connecticut Watershed goes directly into our streams, rivers and lakes untreated through the storm drain system. Along its way it picks up contaminants in its path. That's why it is important to make sure that pollutants such as pet waste do not end up in our storm drains.

WHY AREN'T DOGS ALLOWED ON DCR WATERSHED LANDS?

DCR's Watershed lands serve as protection for a sensitive drinking water supply for 2.2 million Massachusetts residents.

Bacteria and other parasites, such as Giardia and Cryptosporidium found in pet waste can survive for long periods when left on the ground. During the next rainfall, these can get washed into the drinking water supply, compromising water quality which is regulated by state and federal laws.

Please pick up after your pet and DO NOT throw bagged waste into the woods!

How you can help



- BRING IT- Always bring a plastic bag when you walk your dog.
- BAG IT-Use the bag as a glove to pick up the pet waste. Scoop up the waste and turn the bag inside out around the waste.
- DISPOSE IT- Properly dispose the waste by placing it in a trash can or flushing it unbagged down the toilet. **NEVER THROW WASTE DOWN A STORM DRAIN!**
- WASH YOUR HANDS
- Pick up after your pet in your yard.
- Only bring your dog where dogs are allowed.
