material will still be available.

We will focus in the next few weeks on keeping our Police, Fire, and BOH updated on state mandates and suggestions. The small size of our town makes for difficulties because we have a limited number of employees and volunteers and in case of quarantines or sickness, we must have plans in place for backup. That's why it is so important that everyone abide by the guidelines and stay home if possible. All schools are closed in the state and many local businesses in our neighboring towns are reducing hours or even closing.

Governor Baker has relaxed the open meeting law, which will help us continue to function as a town; conference calls or emails to communicate will be allowed. Right now it is all within us to do what we can to slow the virus down. Neighbors helping one another with groceries and just checking on one another will be a heartfelt help and make our community safer.

During this time, walking in the Leyden Wildlife Management Area is a great way to relieve a stressful day. The trails can be entered from Eden Trail, the Leyden Glen where the blinking sign is located, and from Barton Road where it goes up to Camp Lion Knoll. From the access area off of Glen Road it is about a 3 ½ mile hike to Camp Lion Knoll so bring some water and enjoy the views. There is spectacular scenery down into the Pioneer Valley, and it is all in our back yard to enjoy. The Leyden State Forest is another beautiful walk. Behind the Methodist Church is a trail through privately-owned land which has been put into conservation, and allows for walking; this will lead eventually to the Leyden State Forest. Conservation signs around town identify the numerous parcels of land which have been made available to walkers.

Our Town Clerk will be handling nomination papers for elected positions that will need to be filled for your name to appear on the ballot at the town meeting on May 16<sup>th</sup> for elections of officers. Information will be available and forms can be picked up at the Leyden Town Offices on Brattleboro Road. The Selectboard is continuing to work on our fiscal 2021 budget and when complete, will be posted for information only for review on the town website. There will be no pre town meeting as in the past for review of the Warrant Articles. We thank you all for doing your part and listening to the advice that we must all take a part in. It truly is a small world today. If you haven't signed up for the new RAVE alert system in Leyden go to the town website and take the time, as this system will be used in the coming weeks to help get you up to date information, along with our blinking sign, and website. Until then stay safe, stay informed and check on your neighbor

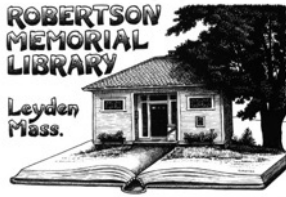


## Knitting Circle

## Climate Corner

While we are uncertain of its origin, the phrase, “May you live in interesting times,” is often described as a curse disguised as a blessing. Whichever it is, we are definitely living in “interesting times” right now. It seems fitting to offer a hybrid column this month, some of which is directed by “opportunities” forced upon us by the times.

As promised, here is additional information on regenerative agricultural practices, through the words of my neighbor, Chuck Foley. It tracks well with much of what I have read on the topic, which is likely to be far less reading than he has done:

My big thing is pasture rotation. Ideally the animal should be moved every day. Keep the pasture small enough that the animals eat almost everything. That has been referred to as making them eat the box as well as the ice cream. If they only eat the best stuff, those plants will be set back and the undesirable plants will take over. You also need to make sure they are getting enough to eat as their health will suffer (if they don't). Better to err on the side of caution.

Hopefully the animals won't be back to that area until it has fully recovered. When the animal eats the plant, the roots will die back supplying organic matter for the soil microbes to eat thus improving the soil, sequestering CARBON, and feeding the plants. The animal waste will also be broken down to the same end. By keeping the pastures small, you help concentrate where the droppings fall. It doesn't help your pasture if all the manure is concentrated under some shade tree.

A big “thanks” to Chuck whose sources of information are given below. There will be more on agricultural practices in future columns.

In the coming weeks, as we spend more time close to home, many will turn to often neglected tasks: cleaning out, simplifying, and engaging in reflection about what we really need. It's a good time to practice the 3 R's: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. The next column will focus on recycling and reuse of cloth and fabric. Staying linked as a community while keeping a physical distance offers additional possibilities for this newsletter. Please share your own strategies for clothing/fabric which is beyond donation or repair. Stay connected and continue in health through these “interesting times.”

This too shall pass. Thank you everyone for all of your cooperation in this very confusing and frightening time. Unfortunately, it is not over. Everyone should be diligent and take this time of self quarantine seriously.

There is information on the town website if you have questions on the difference between self quarantine and isolation. If you are in a group, there should be no more than 10. Social distancing should be practiced with a distance of 6 feet between people.

Great sources of information are on the CDC, Mass. Dept. of Public Health and our local FRCOG websites. Our town website is also being updated daily with new information. The confirmed cases are climbing, but this is to be expected as testing is becoming more available.

We need to pull together as a community and check on our neighbors by phone. Please reach out to the Selectboard, police, fire, Council on Aging or the Board of Health if you are in need of something or have questions.

### Ticks and Reduced Tick Testing

With so much attention to the coronavirus, we also have to remember to protect ourselves and our pets from ticks. Some suggestions are:

1. Use a chemical repellent with DEET, permethrin or picaridin.
2. Wear light-colored protective clothing.
3. Tuck pant legs into socks.
4. Avoid tick-infested areas.
5. Check yourself, your children, and your pets daily for ticks and carefully remove any ticks.

### 2019 Tick Testing Results

Ten Leyden residents received low-cost tick tests in 2019 through a Leyden Board of Health subsidy. 40% of ticks tested in Leyden in 2019 tested positive for the Lyme Disease Pathogen, 10% for the Babesiosis pathogen, and 20% for the Anaplasmosis pathogen.

Should you want to get a tick tested: (the Board of Health encourages you to do so)

- Go to Leyden's website. [Townofleyden.com](http://Townofleyden.com)
- Under the **Government** tab, click on **Board of Health**.
- Click the highlighted section at the end of the paragraph that says, "**Information on having ticks tested**".
- Click on "order a TickReport" and fill out the necessary information.
- You will need a credit card to pay the \$15 fee (rather than the usual \$50 fee)
- Mail the tick (sealed in a plastic bag) with the **Order Number** assigned to you
