Annual Town Meeting will be held at 7:00 PM, polls will open at 4:00 PM closing at 8:00 PM for town elections. There will be no pre town meeting as in the past to go over warrant articles, we hope to have our warrant available for review by early June. Closing of the warrant will take place sometime during the week of June 15th. With the Coronavirus as we all know, things change daily and setting plans late into June is our best hope right now for a 2021 budget.

The new Leyden RAVE warning system has been helpful on our part to keep our community updated during these difficult times. Anyone still not signed up is encouraged to go to the town website and sign up. You can go back, anytime and change the way you would like to get notified, by text, phone or email. We haven't had a chance to ask your feedback on the system, but do hope the messages are helpful.

Westfield Gas and Electric has worked with MBI and have agreed to increase the download speed of one hot spot in each last mile town. In Leyden, this will be done at the town office building, so the download speed will increase from the current 2 MB per second to 250 MB per second. The idea is that people will be able to sit in their cars and work from laptops in the parking lot. It is estimated to be done in 2 weeks, the sign on will have a separate pass code. We will notify residents through

the town's notification system when this occurs. We know this is not a permanent solution, but for the immediate, this was the most promising solution.

We have a new policy on working conditions and expectations during Covid-19 and all town employees, elected officials, department heads, should read it over for everyone's protection during this health crisis that has no boundaries.

With warmer weather and everyone staying at home we know our roads are busy with daily walkers, runners, biking and activities, our district schools are closed and children are out playing. The Police Department has seen an increase in speeding thru town, recent motorcycle accidents of high speed along with vehicles has put our police on notice and many tickets for speeding are now being mailed out without the vehicle being pulled over. In most cases it seems to be out of town drivers, but citations during this time are being mailed out according to Chief Galvis.

There was another outbreak of Rabies in Shelburne with a raccoon; this makes Colrain, Buckland and our town as having a live case of rabies with raccoons. Please make sure your pets are licensed in town so the town clerk has an updated list of pets that have vaccinations. We are a farming community and livestock live everywhere in town.

Leyden still remains in its longest state of emergency; our town is challenged with conducting business in many other ways. We are still feeling our way through the many daily changes. We know these are difficult times but we will see our way through it. We ask that you check on your neighbor. Our COA, Board of Health, Police Department, Selectboard are all available if you need help during these times. We would also like to mention a big thank you to our Leyden Life staff that continues to inform our community of what's taking place in our town, especially right now.

There are however plenty of online resources to keep you occupied! You can sign up for an ecard from the Boston Public Library (www.bpl.org/ecard/) and have access to all of the ebooks and audio books that you could ask for, along with movies and shows! It's free and easy! Head on over to the library Facebook page for activities and storytimes! Our parking lot has been busy with folks using our internet connection! The network information is posted on the building so you can sign in easily. These are uncertain times: I hope that you are all well and remain so.

Climate Corner

The average American throws away 64 lb. of clothing a year. For local residents, clothing put into the trash ends up in a landfill. As it decomposes, it releases methane gas, a much more powerful greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide. Here is the good news: all three of the R's can apply as alternatives to the landfill for your unwanted or damaged textiles.

REDUCE: If you purchase fewer pieces, you reduce your carbon footprint. Buying habits have been going the opposite direction in our culture unfortunately. U. S. consumers bought 60% more clothing in the year 2014 than they did in the year 2010 and kept each piece for half as long, according to the World Resources Institute. Rethinking our purchases and shopping more at consignment (local business) stores and charity thrift stores (Goodwill, Salvation Army...) could make a big difference.

REUSE: Passing on your used textiles can bring joy to the recipient (as in the huge box of baby clothes I received from a colleague many years ago), employment (Goodwill, Salvation Army...) and contributes to other charities, but it also provides environmental benefits. Many textiles can be repaired or repurposed. From creative patching, to wall hangings, lap quilts and pillows, your textiles can live again. A student I saw frequently in the halls of Monument Mountain Regional High School in the 80's has put her twin passions for art and the environment into a thriving upscaling business. Crispina ffrench's pieces range from luxurious quilts constructed of felted wool pieces (obtained from discarded sweaters) to pincushion jars, and no sew T-shirt aprons for children. Checkout Crispina's website or her blog, Rag, for ideas.

RECYCLE: Clothing and textiles that are damaged, stained, and missing buttons are accepted by some charities. PlanetAid sorts the bags they receive and sells such textile pieces to recyclers who use them to produce insulation, furniture pads, and rag rugs. Their bright yellow donation bins can be found in Bernardston and Greenfield. Please do not leave bags outside. Wet or moldy donations cannot be used.

Broadband Hut Has Landed

Leyden moved one step closer to high speed internet on April 2, when a 45,000 lb. "telecommunications hut" was delivered and installed across the street from the Town Offices on Brattleboro Rd. Leyden's Dave Vreeland oversaw the installation, along with DPW head Dave Brooks. The hut will eventually contain all the electronics required to control and maintain the new internet/telephone system. The 9' x 16' ft. concrete building was manufactured in Connecticut and was hoisted to the site by Davenport Trucking of Greenfield. Telecommunications is considered an essential business during the virus, which fortunately allowed the delivery to continue as planned.

We can also report that Verizon and Eversource have officially completed their task of moving wires and replacing poles that do not meet industry regulations. The next phase will begin this June with the hanging of 35 miles of fiber from pole to pole throughout the town. The final step should start in early October and entails connecting the fiber directly to each house and setting up the Internet connection for those who have subscribed to the service. A subscription sign-up campaign will begin this summer. We currently expect the entire project to be completed by December of this year.
